





Dear Fellow Nobles,

Shriners International and Shriners Hospitals for Children® have a unique and very special relationship. While the two are separate organizations, they are united by a shared mission to improve the lives of children. Every Shriner and every staff member is committed to that effort.

That said, we have been communicating for some time now that, while our mission is sound and will not change, Shriners Hospitals' primary care delivery model must change to meet today's needs and expectations. We have explained that continuing to operate in the same manner, including maintaining all our large inpatient-focused facilities, is extremely and unnecessarily expensive, and takes funds away from our mission of patient care.

Approximately 85 percent of pediatric medical procedures are now performed in an outpatient setting, and this trend is expected to continue. We must adjust our delivery model to reflect this industry change.

We are responding, and in August, our Tampa facility will become the fifth in our health care system to become an outpatient or ambulatory care center. We have also been emphasizing reaching more kids by using today's technology, particularly telehealth, and by increasing community affiliations and access points. We will continue working to determine the best care models to meet both industry trends and our patient families' needs and expectations throughout our system.

At the 2018 Imperial Session, we reiterated the current situation, including that of inpatient numbers, daily censuses and operational costs. At that meeting, the voting representatives supported and approved moving forward with plans to realign and restructure several hospitals, including Cincinnati. These plans had been discussed and shared with the nobility over the previous several months, as well as just prior to Imperial Session. We have worked very hard to provide information to the nobles and staff throughout the process.

Specifically, having our Cincinnati location share space with another hospital was approved, with the provision that approval was also given by the Joint Boards and the Board of Governors of the Cincinnati Shriners Hospital. Both these boards approved the choice of Dayton Children's Hospital.

Shriners Hospitals for Children – Cincinnati was established in the mid-1960s in response to a lack of pediatric burn care. Over time, the severity and frequency of pediatric burn injuries has declined in the United States. Many procedures for these injuries, due in part to advances in treating burns pioneered by Shriners Hospitals for Children, have shifted from an inpatient to an outpatient setting.

The Cincinnati hospital has 30 inpatient beds. In 2018, the average daily census was 4.1. Repositioning our Cincinnati hospital with Dayton Children's will allow us to continue to deliver high-quality burn care and other services in a space that meets the needs of our patients today more appropriately, economically and efficiently.

We know that change is hard. Some will see change as a detriment – and some will see it as an opportunity and a challenge. What everyone needs to see is that it is our mission that is important, and that change has always been part of Shriners Hospitals for Children. It is no longer a single hospital created to serve children coping with the aftereffects of the poliovirus. Shriners Hospitals has changed and adapted repeatedly to meet the needs of the children it serves. Today's need for change is another example of being responsive to our patient families, as well as responding to trends and expectations of the health care industry.

Shriners Hospitals' total U.S. inpatient volume has decreased by 31 percent from 2013 to 2017; at the same time, operating expenses for inpatient visits have increased by 60 percent.

Continuing to operate indefinitely as a system designed primarily for inpatient care is just not financially feasible or efficient any longer. It is important to remember that our reputation for excellent, compassionate care has nothing to do with big, beautiful buildings, and that, in fact, the expense of our buildings financially impacts our ability to provide care.

As an organization that relies on the generosity of our donors, we must be good and conscientious stewards of resources, including our facilities' physical size and area.


The move to Dayton Children's makes it possible for Shriners Hospitals for Children to maintain its presence in southwest Ohio and continue to provide its local patients throughout its eight-state catchment area with regional access to burn care and reconstructive surgery services, while also offering care to children wherever they may live.

We are confident that if each of us – every noble and every staff member – focuses on our mission of providing excellent specialty care to children, works together, and trusts and supports the decisions of the voting representatives and board members, we can, and will, successfully transform our amazing, compassionate health care system and position it for a strong, respected second hundred years.

As we approach Easter and Passover, it is appropriate that we be reminded of one of the great symbols of Masonry: the sprig of acacia. This symbol of faith calls to memory our trust in the promises of God and the immortality of man. How did this thorny bush achieve such an exalted position?

The acacia tree, of which there are hundreds of species throughout the world, blooms with a small yellow or white flower which has a sweet odor and is frequently used to make perfume. The flowers produce a bean or pod by which the trees are propagated. The wood has a beautiful grain which ranges from blond to dark brown.

In the Old Testament, it was referred to as shittah wood and was used to construct the Tabernacle, the Ark of the Covenant, and the sacred furniture. It has always been consecrated from all other trees because of this use. Because of this sacred purpose, it held a special significance to the Jews who often placed a sprig of acacia at the head of a



grave.

To the Freemason, it has become a symbol of the immortality of the soul. The flowers which come forth and are cut off remind us of the transitory nature of human life, and the perpetual renovation of the evergreen reminds us of our spiritual life.

In our funeral service, we are reminded that we have an immortal part within us that shall survive the grave and never, never die.

Hospital Transportation

More hospital news – The March 13 issue of the Cincinnati Enquirer reported that the Shriners Burns Hospital – Cincinnati is being shut down. The article did not give a specific date. It was stated that there is an with arrangement Dayton Children's Hospital to treat burns patients. No mention was made of the burns treatment research as to its relocation. The Cincinnati Burns hospital has 30 beds for overnight patients, and this year is its 50th anniversary. This same article described Shriners as "a 146national vear-old men's fellowship organization," and noted that the hospitals are our philanthropy branch.

The Dayton relocation seems a bit unusual in that the Cincinnati Burns Hospital is located in the middle of what is known locally as "Pill Hill." There are five highquality hospitals within a three-mile radius,

one of which is Cincinnati Children's Hospital, and that is not much more than 200 yards to the northwest.

The Dayton, Ohio location could be a transportation issue because one of our primary donators is Southwest Airlines, and Dayton (Vandalia Airport) is not one of their business locations. Southwest donates about 1,500 one-way domestic flights each year to the Shriners for the transportation of our patients, which is 375 round trips for patients and The Sahib Hospital escorts. Transportation unit has nominally six to eight patients a year who need to go to Cincinnati Burns for ongoing treatments, follow-ups, and initial treatments. The flight costs to us would be in the range of \$3,200-\$3,500 from the Transportation Fund. Historically, we were able to use the Southwest e-passes for about half of the trips, so the savings for us is worthwhile. The e-passes are used nationally where ever Southwest, a Shrine Center, and a Shriners Hospital are connected and will be used up in about six months.

The 375 round-trip Southwest e-passes average in the range of \$400 each, totaling \$130,000. They not only donate the seats, but they accommodate us by allowing last minute reservations, seating the patient and escort together, handling any special arrangements the patient needs, and allowing the hospital to make any return date and time changes. Southwest flies Sahib patients to St. Louis, Chicago, Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Boston, and Galveston (via Houston Hobby). Southwest Airlines is a Shriners Partner. They make a big difference in our patient's lives, and they are a company that we, as Nobles, need to support.

Sahib Hospital Transportation recently lost one of its past Chairmen. Ken Clark, 79 years old, passed away having contracted ALS. Ken stepped down as Chairman in August of 2017, as he felt he could no longer



communicate as need be. He was a transplant from Baltimore, Maryland, where he received his Master Mason degree and obtained the 32nd degree. He was active as a DeMolay advisor, where he had the opportunity to be at a national convention in Kansas City, Missouri, and meet President Harry S. Truman – a proud moment for Ken. He was a graduate of Towson State University, retired from NSA, and earlier had been a math teacher.

Ken was the fifth Chairman since the mid-1980s when Sahib began transporting patients. He was the prime mover in the streamlining transition of all paperwork to computer and some paperwork. Ken developed the forms for the patient database, process record keeping, re-occurring contact data, and driver trip information. That transition was not an easy project. He had to battle the old timers' attitude of "it was good enough then, and it's good enough now."

Ken brought Hospital Transportation into the computer age. His computer contributions will be used for as long as Sahib transports patients.




Oriental Band Notes






Masonic Digest / Scottish Rite

The Fellow Craft degree highlights the five human senses before proceeding to a discussion of the seven liberal arts and sciences. The first three of each of these lists appear to be related and might be paired.

The first three—arts and sciences, grammar, rhetoric and logic—address how we communicate with others and express ourselves. The importance of each is well described in the Lecture. Hearing, seeing, and feeling are the natural senses by which we effectuate our expressions.

We hear arguments and can understand them if they are grammatically sufficient. Seeing allows us to judge the sincerity of the speaker's rhetoric. Feeling (as in perceiving) allows us to judge whether the argument is sound, logical, and reasonable. Freemasonry highlights these tools and pairs them for our use, but they are just tools.



Epictetus

The Greek stoic, Epictetus (55-135), provides context for the proper and effective use of these tools, and he reminds us that they are but tools. Sight and hearing, he submits, "Have been appointed to be slaves and subordinate" to another human faculty. They are but tools for the wise and virtuous man. "An eye," he says, "when open, has no option but to see." The decision of what to look at or to observe rests with the wisdom and virtue of the beholder.

The "faculty of expression and arranging words [grammar and rhetoric] ... does

nothing more than dress up and organize ... a given topic, the way a hairdresser arranges hair. But whether to speak at all or remain silent" is the province of good judgement and of the will.

Epictetus asserted the great human sense, or element, was that of the *will*. The *will* to pursue truth, wisdom, and knowledge, the *will* to employ good judgement and act virtuously.

The will controls "speech, as well as every other faculty, great and small." Is there any faculty stronger, he asks? "What can obstruct the will? Nothing external ... which is why virtue applies to it alone."


Perhaps there is an intersection with Freemasonry and our life journey. While learning to well employ our senses and develop communication skills, we must frame our lives to put them to good use. That requires knowledge and virtue. It requires willpower.

It was our "will" as Entered Apprentices to search for knowledge and truth; to learn virtuous habits and right conduct. Our search and journey continues through the Symbolic Lodge and the Scottish Rite.

The human senses and arts and sciences are but our tools to assist us in our travels. We must have the will to use them wisely. Epictetus encourages us.

The Scottish Rite's degrees will next be conferred May 18 and 19, 2019. Petitions are available here: http://tampascottishrite.org. The Rite meets the second Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m., preceded by a dinner at 5:45 p.m. At the April 8 meeting, we will honor Brethren who passed to the Celestial Lodge during the past year in a Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal.

- Why not collect the whole can? Collecting complete cans would require a great deal more storage space. You should go ahead and recycle the rest of the can in the normal way, in the dumpster behind Sahib.
- 2. How many tabs in a pound? 1,267.
- How many tabs will a gallon milk jug hold? About 5 pounds worth.
- 4. How does it work and where does the money go? The tabs are delivered to the Sahib office (or almost any Sahib club/unit location) and then taken to the recycling center. The money netted from recycling goes directly into the "Wheel Chair Repair Fund" at the Tampa Shriners Hospital for Children.


